

Serving Ukrainian Refugees in Poland

Sister Valerie Binder was so moved by the tragedy and chaos surrounding the war in Ukraine, and by the suffering of the people there, she volunteered to serve at a Humanitarian Aid center in Poland. The center, located in Przemysl, Poland, serves as a first stopping point for Ukrainian refugees entering the country.

Sister Valerie traveled with a group of 20 others from her parish, St. Clare of Montefalco in Grosse Point, Michigan near Detroit, and together they served from April 4 to 13. The volunteers cleaned and prepared overnight and living spaces for the endless wave of incoming refugees, people shocked and worn by their sudden displacement.

“It was heartbreaking to see the busses coming in full of women, children and the elderly, carrying what they could or dragging suitcases, some crying, all looking dazed,” she said. “I pray every night for them and that the Holy Spirit moves to put an end to this war.”

We pray for them, and for ALL the oppressed of the world, that they may know SAFETY and PEACE.

St. Luke N.E.W. Life Center Celebrates 20th Anniversary

Sister Judy Blake, CSJ and Sister Carol Weber, OP, along with some of the parishioners of St. Luke Catholic Church, started doing street ministry in the early 90s in Flint, Michigan. As they shared meals and clothing, they heard many stories of the plight of the women and children in Flint. Questions began to form. “What can we do for these women to make their lives less desperate?” “What can we offer that will help grow their spirit?”

The answer came when they founded St. Luke N.E.W. Life Center in 2002. Celebrating its 20th anniversary, the N.E.W. Life Center is a faith-based organization that provides life skills, education and workplace training to help women and men become self-sufficient.

Today, Sisters Judy and Carol, Director of Operations Bob Nelson, and other staff and volunteers provide a safe environment for survivors of abuse and poverty. The center provides access for people to learn and further their education with the help of volunteer tutors, basic life skills classes to those who need it, and maybe most important, encouragement along the way.

In addition to employment preparation programs, St. Luke N.E.W. Life Center operates three social enterprises, a food pantry that serves over 3,000 people monthly, and a variety of community services, including crisis intervention, after school tutoring, an

eyeglass clinic and a literacy center. These services are critical as they provide participants the additional services needed to support their families while they gain real-world experience during the program.

Sister Judy Blake says she sees her own childhood in the people she now works so passionately to help. “People come to the Center for all kinds of help,” she said. “They’re broken in spirit, they’ve lost their self-esteem, and sometimes they want to give up and die. I understand where they’re coming from and I’m here because God trained me for this ministry from a very young age.”

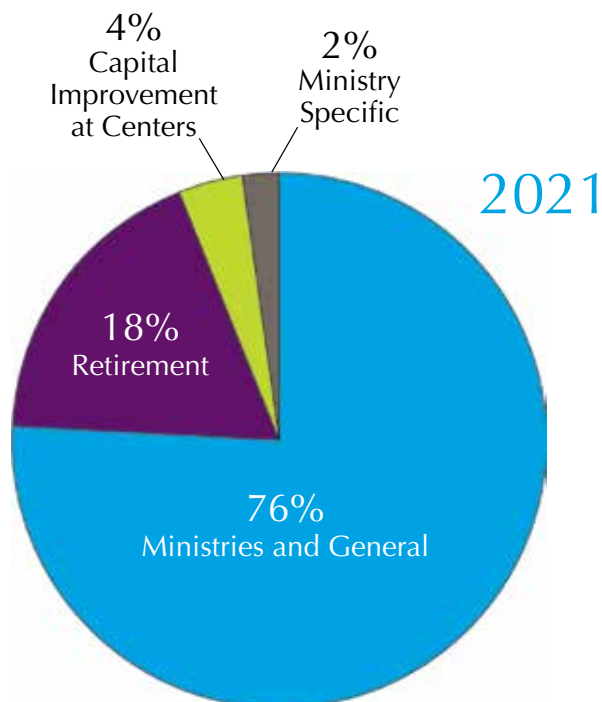
